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Guarantees and warranties in private sewing machine sales (UK)

This document explains how **guarantees and warranties** apply when buying a second-hand sewing machine from a **private seller**, and how this differs from buying from a dealer.

It is written to help buyers understand what protection they do, and do not, have, and to avoid assumptions that commonly lead to disputes and disappointment.

Key reality check

In a private sale, you should assume there is no guarantee and no warranty unless it is explicitly offered in writing.

Most private second-hand sewing machines are sold "as seen".

Guarantees from private sellers

- Private sellers are **not legally required** to offer a guarantee or warranty.
- Once the sale is completed, the seller has **no ongoing responsibility** for faults that appear later, provided the machine was **accurately described at the time of sale**.
- Statements such as "it's been fine for me", "it works perfectly", or "it's a good machine" are **not guarantees**.

If a private seller offers a guarantee

Occasionally, a private seller may offer a short guarantee (for example, a 24-hour or 7-day return period). If so:

- The guarantee is **voluntary**
- The terms must be clear and agreed in writing
- It applies only to what is explicitly stated
- It does not create wider consumer rights

If it is not written down, it should be treated as **not offered**.



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Manufacturer warranties

Manufacturer warranties are frequently misunderstood in second-hand sales.

- Most manufacturer warranties apply only to the original purchaser
- Many are non-transferable
- Proof of original purchase is usually required

Even if a warranty appears to be within date, it may be **void** if:

- Ownership has changed
- The machine has not been serviced according to requirements
- Repairs have been carried out by unauthorised persons
- The warranty explicitly excludes second-hand owners

You should never assume a manufacturer warranty transfers with the machine unless this is **explicitly confirmed by the manufacturer**.

Extended warranties and third-party cover

Extended warranties or third-party cover rarely apply to machines bought privately.

- They are usually linked to the original retail purchase
- They are often non-transferable
- They may require registration in the original buyer's name

If documentation is offered, it should be checked directly with the provider **before purchase**.

Dealer guarantees (for comparison)

When buying from a sewing machine dealer rather than a private individual:

- Guarantees or warranties are common
- Consumer rights are stronger
- Faults arising shortly after purchase may give legal remedies

These protections **do not apply** to private sales, even if the machine and price are similar.



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What guarantees do not cover

Even where a guarantee exists, it typically does **not** cover:

- Wear and tear
- Consumable parts
- Damage caused by misuse, poor storage, or lack of servicing
- Pre-existing faults not disclosed or not noticed

Why this matters

Many disputes around second-hand sewing machines arise because buyers assume a level of protection that simply does not exist in private sales.

Understanding the limits of guarantees and warranties helps you:

- Make informed decisions
- Set realistic expectations
- Decide when a professional inspection is worthwhile

If a guarantee or warranty matters to you, a private sale may not be the right route.

In higher-value purchases, the safest alternatives are:

- Buying from a reputable dealer
- Commissioning a professional pre-purchase inspection
